November 2022 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS



Officer Sean Donelan spoke at Woodfill Elementary for Veteran's Day. Woodfill planned a program honoring the veterans whose children or grandchildren attend Woodfill, and Sean, being a veteran himself and grew up in Fort Thomas as well, was the guest speaker. At the age of 32 Sean enlisted in the United States Air Force. Two years later he was selected to attend Officer Candidate School. He was stationed in numerous locations: Texas, Mississippi, Ohio, Tennessee, Hawaii, Germany, Guam and in the summer of 2009, Iraq. In 2016 he received an Honorable Discharge and left the Air Force with the rank of Captain. Sean has also been a volunteer Firefighter & Emergency Medical Technician with the Highland Heights Fire Department. Sean continues his community service as a member of the Fort Thomas Lions Club.

TRAINING

Officer Nick Hoffman attended ***Basic Investigator Course***. This is an 80-hour course designed to teach fundamental investigative techniques to investigators. Topics will include: Legal, Interviewing and Report Writing, Property Crimes and Crime Scene, Death Investigations, Overdose Deaths, Child Abuse, Interviewing related to Child Abuse, Sexual Assaults, Narcotics, Electronic Crimes, Search Warrants, and Technology / Investigative resources. Crime scene and evidence collection in relation to all topics taught. Officers will be given a case and will have to investigate the case to include the crime scene process. Officers will present the case on the final day to the instructors for a final grade.

Lieutenant Adam Noe attended **Local Agency Security Officer Training**. LASO means the person designated as the primary information security contact between a local law enforcement agency and the CSA. The LASO actively represents their agency in all matters pertaining to information security, disseminates information security alerts and other material to their constituents, maintains information security documentation (including system configuration data), assists with information security audits of hardware and procedures, and keeps the CSA informed as to any information security needs and problems.

Sergeant Michael Dietz received his certificates for **Law Enforcement Tactical Officer and Advanced Law Enforcement Officer** thru the KY Law Enforcement Council, Career Development Program. The Career Development Program (CDP) began in January of 2003 and is administered by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council. It is a voluntary program that recognizes you as a law enforcement officer for meeting specific standards within training, education, and experience as you proceed forward in your career. Professional certificates are awarded to law enforcement officers in the career paths of patrol, investigations, traffic, advanced deputy, and management. Officers can earn a certificate at the basic, intermediate, and advanced levels as well as in management. The CDP encourages you to organize your training which results in the study of a focused and comprehensive body of knowledge within a particular career path. It assists you in setting training and educational goals from year to year. To earn a certificate you must take certain core training courses and/or courses that teach you a specific technical, human, or conceptual skill. In addition, you must also meet requirements in full time experience as well as education through a college degree or by accumulating educational training points from annual training or college hours completed.

Officer Sean Donelan attended **Document Inspection for Law Enforcement**. This training provides participants with the skills to evaluate the authenticity of identification documents and ensure that documents are lawfully possessed. This course provides a professional and comprehensive examination of overt and covert security features of genuine current state driver's licenses and federal travel documents. The course provides tools and techniques that participants can use during the interview process to identify imposters and to examine identification documents that subjects present to them.

RECOGNITION:

Sergeant Derek Faught received a note of appreciation for his assistance to a driver that ran out of gas. "I want to make you aware of the kind deed one of your officers performed for me and a group of my friends. We were going home from my dental surgery when we ran out of gas. Sergeant Faught came to our rescue and helped my friend get gas for her car so she could get me home quickly. I can't tell you how thankful we were. Everything was done in a very timely manner. ENFORCEMENT:

In November officers wrote 32 speeding charges, 19 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 39 traffic related charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 27 written warnings and totaled 19 court appearances. There were 12 drug related charges involving 7 adults and 2 drug related charges involving a juvenile. Four of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 7 of the charges.

In the NKY/Cincinnati area there have been an increase in thefts of catalytic converters. These items are stolen for the precious metals inside and are scrapped.
