February 2023 Monthly Report Summary

COMMUNITY EVENTS:

School Resource Officer Zac Rohlfer, Officer Jeremy Moore, and Sergeant Derek Faught spoke to the Highlands High School Senior Government Classes about general police information and contemporary policing issues.

Lieutenant Noe visited the students at St. Thomas School for St. Thomas Career Day. He talked to three groups of students consisting of 40 kids from grades 3rd – 8th. He spoke about police work in general, and more specifically, the different types of jobs in policing, how to become a police officer, and what being an officer is like.



To celebrate Catholic School Week students at St. Thomas recognized community partners in celebration of their contributions to Fort Thomas. They once again recognized first responders for their service to the City. Students and teachers delivered hand-made thank you cards and “snack baskets” and personally thanked each organization. Thank you to everyone involved.

TRAINING:

Lieutenant Nathan Day attended **Personal Crimes**. This course covers the topics of interpersonal violence investigations which include domestic violence, child abuse, human trafficking, and sexual assault. Within these topics many of the investigative techniques are similar. This course teaches the student how to conduct investigations as trauma informed and victim centered. The course also discusses evidence associated with each of these investigations.

Officer Sean Donelan attended **Assisting Individuals in Crisis**. This course provides the student the necessary skills in Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) to assist individuals within their agency who been involved in and/or witnessed a traumatic event by intervention designed to mitigate the crisis response, to foster natural resiliency through stabilization and symptom reduction, and a return to adaptive functioning or if needed, the facilitation of access to continued care by trained professionals.

Lieutenant Brent Moening and Sergeant Michael Dietz attended **Emerging Legal Trends and Liability Management for Tactical, SWAT and Emergency Response Operations**. One of the most critical tasks in law enforcement involves the use of tactical officers to accomplish high risk operations. This program takes a three-tier approach. First, participants will be presented with the legal cases that impact tactical operations and ultimately, liability. Second, participants will be presented with policy issues that may be considered for implementation. Finally, the training turns toward the practical implementation of the legal and policy issues in a manner that does not compromise tactical operations or officer safety.

Officer Kalin Holland received his certificate for **Law Enforcement Officer Investigator** thru the KY Law Enforcement Council, Career Development Program. The Career Development Program (CDP) began in January of 2003 and is administered by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council. It is a voluntary program that recognizes you as a law enforcement officer for meeting specific standards within training, education, and experience as you proceed forward in your career. Professional certificates are awarded to law enforcement officers in the career paths of patrol, investigations, traffic, advanced deputy, and management. Officers can earn a certificate at the basic, intermediate, and advanced levels as well as in management. The CDP encourages you to organize your training which results in the study of a focused and comprehensive body of knowledge within a particular career path. It assists you in setting training and educational goals from year to year. To earn a certificate you must take certain core training courses and/or courses that teach you a specific technical, human, or conceptual skill. In addition, you must also meet requirements in full time experience as well as education through a college degree or by accumulating educational training points from annual training or college hours completed.

RECOGNITION:

Lieutenant Adam Noe received a note of appreciation from Grace, a student at St. Thomas School. "Thank you for keeping us safe."

Detective Brandon Vance received a thank note from a PA resident. "Thank you so much for contacting me about finding my stolen check from that Bronx criminal ring."

ENFORCEMENT:

In February officers wrote 25 speeding charges, 33 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and traffic related charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 121 written warnings and totaled 10 court appearances. There were 18 drug related charges placed against 13 adults and 2 drug related charges against one juvenile. Two of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 16 of the charges.

Fort Thomas Police Investigations

February 2023 Monthly Report

Detectives received 11 new cases in February. The reported offenses include the following: Theft of Services, Rape, Theft by Unlawful Taking, several Theft by Deception, Death Investigations, and assisted in multiple organized crime cases, resulting in Federal agencies taking over the cases.

Trending

The FTPD Investigations section has been busy following up on leads and evidence from the case load in 2022. The past year was busy and there was an increase in serious felony investigations. The investigation section was responsible for the successful arrest and prosecution on multiple cases, this can be located in the 2022 Annual Report.

This month, there were multiple theft offenses committed. A majority are from cars being left unlocked. We suggest that you lock your doors and to remove valuables. Scam type offenses are very common in Fort Thomas and have continued into 2023. This month, there were three similar cases, two of the three were related to Bitcoin. These investigations have lead to it being done by foreign suspects.

An arrest was made this month during a criminal abuse of a child, that case is ongoing. However, from a search warrant Detectives were able to charge the suspect with thefts from vehicles. That suspect is a Fort Thomas resident.
