## *March 2023 Monthly Report Summary*

### COMMUNITY EVENTS:



Kristopher and Kolten Kellinghaus were the raffle winners at the Johnson Elementary School Hullabaloo Festival. They won a ride to school with Officer Kalen Holland. ### TRAINING:

Lieutenant Nathan Day completed *Crisis Intervention Team Training for Kentucky Law Enforcement*. This course is designed to provide the student with the skills and knowledge to effectively respond to and resolve issues related to a call for service involving a person with a mental illness.

Lieutenant Adam Noe completed *Cyber Division Tech Talks Training Course* through the Department of Homeland Security. This training keeps former students updated with current information in this ever-changing Cyber Field.

Officer Alex Hall completed *Digital Crime Scene Course*. This course is designed to familiarize the law enforcement officer with different types of electronic evidence, digital crime scenes, and associated crimes. The course will introduce the student to terms and processes to understand the available evidence and how it is collected. With social media being an important part of daily lives, this course explains how to use social media to gather information, obtain data through cellular phones, and cellular towers, to aid in a criminal investigation. The course will cover documenting digital crime scenes and how to package the electronic evidence. Students will be assessed utilizing a graded rubric through exercises included in the course sessions.

Lieutenant Nathan Day completed *Personal Crimes*. This course covers the topics of interpersonal violence investigations which include domestic violence, child abuse, human trafficking, and sexual assault. Within these topics many of the investigative techniques are similar. This course teaches the student how to conduct investigations as trauma informed and victim centered. The course all discusses evidence associated with each of these investigations. NOTE: A pre-course assignment will be available two weeks before the course begins and must be completed before the first day of the course.

Officer Nick Hoffman completed *Drug Investigative Techniques*. This course is designed to provide law enforcement personnel with the basic understanding and training to safely investigate narcotics-related criminal activities. The learning outcomes will include identifying the current investigative techniques related to illegal drugs trafficked in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The student will be able to identify current behaviors associated with deception, along with those that could indicate a potential attack against the officer. Students will also be introduced to Drug Trafficking Organizations with influential ties within the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Officer Jeremy Moore completed *Basic Tactical Medical Instructor Training Program*. BTMITP is a highly intense training program requiring a physical demand on the student and consists of lecture, labs and skill practice. The law enforcement officer will gain knowledge and skills necessary to mitigate the loss of their life or the life of another while in a dynamic environment. The skills will address treating life threatening injuries in an austere environment with limited equipment, lack of medically trained personnel and prolonged time to evacuation.

Officer Sean Donelan completed *Contemporary Policing in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century*. This course is designed to inform and enhance a law enforcement officer's awareness of the topics that are prevalent in policing during the 21st century. The focus will be officer safety, officer wellness, human trafficking, hazardous device awareness, social media, advancements in police technology, legal updates, policing in times of crisis, and autism and the first responder. The student will be able to demonstrate an understanding of the above topics through class discussion, graded homework assignments, and a written exam at the end of the course.

Officer Nick Hoffman completed *Intermediate Law Enforcement Officer and Law Enforcement Investigator* and received his certificates thru the KY Law Enforcement Council, Career Development Program. The Career Development Program (CDP) began in January of 2003 and is administered by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council. It is a voluntary program that recognizes you as a law enforcement officer for meeting specific standards within training, education, and experience as you proceed forward in your career. Professional certificates are awarded to law enforcement officers in the career paths of patrol, investigations, traffic, advanced deputy, and management. Officers can earn a certificate at the basic, intermediate, and advanced levels as well as in management. The CDP encourages you to organize your training which results in the study of a focused and comprehensive body of knowledge within a particular career path. It assists you in setting training and educational goals from year to year. To earn a certificate you must take certain core training courses and/or courses that teach you a specific technical, human, or conceptual skill. In addition, you must also meet requirements in full time experience as well as education through a college degree or by accumulating educational training points from annual training or college hours completed.

Officers completed the following Roll Call Trainings.

- St. Elizabeth Strangulation Training
- DT Roll Call: Module 3 - Clinch
- Firearms – Live Fire Exercise
- 2.8 Domestic Violence

Detectives Wayne Duple and Brandon Vance attended Forensic Cellular Investigations for Criminal, Drug, and Homicide Investigators. This course is designed to introduce and educate Detectives and Criminal Investigators how to use digital evidence in Drug and Homicide investigations. The attendee will be instructed in how to use cell phone, social media, cloud data and records during their investigations. Specifically, the following topics about digital evidence will be covered: **Cell Analysis \* Social Media \* Cloud Data**.

### RECOGNITION:



Officer William Martin received the 2022 Impaired Driving Enforcement Governor's Award. During the time frame of October 1, 2021 thru September 30, 2022, the Fort Thomas Police Department issued 75 citations for the offense of Driving Under the Influence. Officer Martin was responsible for 16 of those charges.

### ENFORCEMENT:

In February officers wrote 27 speeding charges, 20 charges for non-traffic offenses (i.e., warrants, assaults, disorderly conduct, etc.) and 63 traffic related charges (i.e., suspended OL, no insurance, expired license plate, etc.) Officers also issued 147 written warnings and totaled 20 court appearances. There were 25 drug related charges placed against 14 adults and one drug charged a juvenile. Three of the individuals are Fort Thomas residents. Traffic stops led to 20 of the charges.

# Fort Thomas Police Investigations

## March 2023 Monthly Report

In March Detectives received 22 new cases involving 23 KRS Offenses. The reported offenses include the following: Theft by Unlawful Taking, Theft by Deception, Theft of Identity, Theft of Mail Matter, Burglary, Death Investigations, Rape 1st, and an Harassment.

### Trending

The FTPD Investigations section had a busy month in March. There was an increase in theft cases and theft by deception and mail theft. Although in January, a ring from New York was arrested in Fort Thomas. There has been an increase in theft of mail, resulting in theft of identity/deception cases.

Detectives have identified a suspect from Ohio in the mail cases and an arrest will be made. The theft from the mail is an ongoing issue with the Postal Service. Mail carries in the Columbus area of Ohio are being robbed of their "blue box" keys. From there thieves are stealing mail and washing checks for profit.

This month, there were multiple theft offenses committed. A majority are from cars being left unlocked. We suggest locking your doors and removing valuables. Recently, local police agencies have experienced a group armed with guns that are coming in packs to get into cars and steal cars. Those investigations are ongoing. Scam type offenses are very common in Fort Thomas and have continued into 2023. This month, there were five similar cases.

Several indictments have been set up on cases from 2022 and earlier in 2023 after evidence collected identified the suspects.
